# **#prayfortheworld**

Ever since it became simple and speedy to click on a news website I've adopted the habit of checking the news on-line. I still listen to the news while driving or cooking, but most days I click the BBC icon and browse all the latest news. For light relief I click the sport icon and see what's going on there. Currently the British and Irish Lions are in New Zealand but by the time you are reading this they will have either come roaring home or tried to slip back into the country unnoticed.

I try not to get distracted but there are times I seem to visit so frequently I might as well keep the site open. The events following the Brexit vote come to mind. The news of a narrow vote to leave the EU, David Cameron's resignation, the following Conservative leadership contest with all it's twists and turns made one wonder what would happen next? While these things are highly important to us all as a country the media do rather make them into a soap opera and dare I say it, entertainment.

There is nothing entertaining though about the events at Westminster Bridge, the Manchester Arena, London Bridge, outside Finsbury Mosque and the recent fire at Grenfell Tower. The news of these events is so immediate and terrible that we live it vicariously with those caught up in the horror and it feels wrong to turn the news off. Our fascination is not because it is remotely entertaining but because we identify so strongly with those involved; to turn off would feel like "passing by on the other side".

Only a few days after the Manchester Arena bombing, Manchester United played in the final of the UEFA Cup in Stockholm. Normally I might allow myself to have the live text updates in the corner of a screen but it felt wrong to be interested in something so inconsequential in the light of the bombing. Mark Chapman was hosting the coverage on Radio Five Live and expressed with beautiful poignancy that he didn't want to be there, he wanted to be in his home city of Manchester where he couldn't do anything to help but could be there to show that he cared. He hoped that in some small way a victory might comfort the city.

Similarly, after the attack in Paris in 2015, people wanted to respond and the hashtag #prayforparis was re-tweeted thousands and thousands of times. It's not surprising that <u>I</u> want to pray, but it's revealing that many who have no particular religious background or affiliation shared the same desire.

As events are unfolding I don't need to think about what to pray because compassion leads the way. I pray for those suffering and those injured and give thanks for the amazing kindness and goodness of so many people who rush to help. But recently I found myself stuck. How and what do I pray for the people who planned a terrorist attack – or rather those who might be planning one? Jesus says to pray for our enemies...but what do I pray?

We read in the book of Acts that Saul hated Christians. With approval from the religious hierarchy he was persecuting them, throwing some in prison and seeing others put to death. I wonder what the Christians prayed at the time about him? Then on the Damascus road, this man with a hate-filled heart came face to face with Jesus. It so astounded and challenged him that he was converted and turned his life around. Saul was renamed Paul and as an Apostle carried the good news of Jesus across the region and beyond. St Paul became a missionary, theologian and prolific writer and his letters in the New Testament reflect his own amazement that God should show him – the worst of sinners – such compassion.

So I pray for those with hate-filled hearts that they too might have a Damascus Road experience. I pray that those who are deeply angry might find a way to express that anger to change the world for good, not drag it further down into hatred and bitterness. The explosion of anger at the Grenfell Fire has revealed the painful divisions in society and the casual neglect of the safety and wellbeing of those who are poor. How might we cry for justice and seek an outcome that will serve the needs of the poor, without causing further division and hurt? We pray for hard hearts to be transformed.

We live in unsettling and surprising times but instinctively people seem to know how to respond. Great loss is met by great generosity. Brutality is met with acts of kindness. The threat and carnage at one concert is answered by another concert with singing, dancing and standing together. With camera's everywhere and uploads happening all the time, the news website can relay in real time the response of ordinary people. Did you see the policeman dancing with children near the concert at the Old Trafford cricket ground?

Should we ever find ourselves in a position to assist we would all want to do what we can to help, but thanks to instant news and updates whether we are there or not we can pray that in His very great mercy God will transform and heal the brokenness displayed in front of us into something beautiful.






# Youth ...

# YOUTH CAFÉ Friday 7:00 - 8:30 pm


