Hearing from God

Last Summer I had the last bit of decorating to do on the vicarage and a great deal more on a house we own in the Midlands. A tenant had 'decorated' without permission and 'decorated' was not what I would call it.

Normally I would put on the radio but by last Summer I was so heartily sick of A) Brexit and B) political shenanigans and C) teams I wanted to win, losing, I decided to turn elsewhere. Audio Books.

What a revelation! The last person to read me a story was Mr Andoe, class 6, Cherry Grove Junior School, Chester. (Treasure Island).

What a wonderful thing the audio book is. I now listen while driving, cooking, washing up and gardening. All of which gives me reason to reflect. A week ago I finished the Lord of the Rings trilogy which is 60 hours. (Rob Inglis reads – he is very good and does all the songs as well).

It surprised me how much of my life is drifting by behind the wheel, at the cooker, at the sink and in the garden.

What also interests me is that the characters are different to the ones that formed in my head when I read the books for myself. If I like a book, I'll read it a few times. LOTR I've read at least three times and of course this gives me an authoritative view when watching the films. That didn't happen! That's made up! She didn't appear to him in dreams!

Hearing Rob Inglis tell the story, with different voices for different characters, changed how I thought about them. I was more impressed with Frodo, certainly more than the portrayal in the films.

During Lent, a new thing I did every day was to listen to Pray As You Go. (Visit pray-as-you-go.org) It's an app you download onto your phone and each day it lasts about 12 minutes.

As well as music and space to reflect, they read the scripture for the day, twice. (Hear it, think about it, hear it again.) Hearing it read to you can change how you perceive the passage. Then they prompt ideas about which you might pray. Today was the odd story of Jacob wrestling with God and being re-named Israel, Genesis Chp 32. They asked "what are you wrestling with God about?"

Hearing the scripture helps me 'hear' God. The bible recounts a few stories where someone hears God's voice directly, but otherwise what we mean is that through a combination of prayer, reading the bible (or hearing the bible) sharing with others and simply mulling things over, one arrives at a settled conclusion.

It can sound a bit pretentious to say "I believe God has spoken to me on this..." but the more one prays, reads (listens) and critically is silent and still, the more likelihood of understanding what God is trying to communicate.

Which in turn demonstrates that I do believe God wants to communicate with us. Our trouble is listening.

All that said, a former parishioner called Alan had to go for an MRI and he was very anxious about it as he suffered from claustrophobia and the machine is a long narrow noisy tube. They gave him headphones and on two occasions during his session a voice calmly reassured him. When it was over, he thanked the nurse for getting him through it and her calming words. Looking rather puzzled she wasn't sure what he meant...the headphones had been broken a long time.

I've written elsewhere in this magazine about restoring the Chapel in Holy Trinity. As well as a place of prayer and worship, it's a place to listen and maybe to wrestle with God! It's certainly the place to encounter Him. It's the place to read aloud the bible stories to one another. Live audio book!

Prayer

It is somewhat frustrating that the people considered to be experts on prayer; whether saints of old, those with deep spirituality or notables in the religious world all end up saying the same thing. It's a mystery.

That doesn't prevent it being something worth exploring but one has to do so recognising there is going to be no absolute fulfilment in terms of knowledge; but as we explore there will be enlightenment.

Of course, it starts with the belief there is a God. That God listens and takes notice. That God responds... which is where most people get stuck or lose interest because nothing seems to occur when they pray. What's that about?

Pete Grieg writes in his book *Red Moon Rising* "greatest theologian of the twentieth century, Karl Barth, said that 'to clasp the hands in prayer is the beginning of an uprising against the disorder of the world"

I'm not sure those dissatisfied with the experience of prayer quite see it that way.

The saints, spirituals and notables believe God always responds therefore it follows that lots of my prayers have been met with the response, No.

So, what is going on? What is prayer? Who can pray? How should we pray? And what does it do to our faith when God doesn't appear to answer?

These and many more questions we shall be exploring on The Prayer Course created by Pete Grieg and the 24/7 prayer organisation.

Over 8 weeks on Sunday evenings through October and November we shall honestly and openly look at the topic of prayer, our experiences of prayer and seek to discover all that we can.

All are very welcome to come. No qualifications, experience or faith background required, just the desire to explore, seek understanding and look into the mystery of it. Further details will be on the church website.

Transforming Trinity - One step at a time

In the last magazine I wrote about the steps we were taking to refresh the vision for creating a centre for church and community.

The short period that the church had the use of the CMI building over the road demonstrated how valuable extra rooms and offices could be.



Since I last wrote an architect has visited as our consultant to help us think through the priorities and offer some new ideas on achieving what we believe is necessary.

These ideas were agreed as a broad outline by the PCC and were tested out on the DAC (the Diocesan Advisory Committee who oversee all church development). Happily they gave approval. Our next step is to carefully consider the professional partners to make such dreams become reality.

With all this going on, I came across an article in a magazine handed on to me by a long-standing church member.

In 1987 the church held a special evensong to celebrate 100 years of the <u>new</u> Nave. The original church (above) was configured very differently to the one we are familiar with. The tower is at the west end. I'll make sure this picture is posted on our website for anyone interested to have a closer look.

The sanctuary and chapel were retained, but much else was demolished to make way for the nave and aisles we are familiar with now. It was done between 1887 and 1890.

Scroll forward to the magazine 'Trinity 87' and the opening article by Robin Warne. His penultimate paragraph says "Once again the question of accommodation has arisen. Not that the church itself is too small – would that it were! – but there is a need for a small hall for Sunday School to use during the morning service, and the opportunity would be welcome to the parish to provide a separate choir vestry and a parish office as well'.

What has been round comes round and my sincere aim is to finally make those extra spaces!

But while the process can be slow, we have been busy. We gained permission from the DAC for the "Summer Shuffle'; to make the very best use of the church as it is now while we plan for bigger things.

To our great satisfaction the Lady Chapel has been restored as a chapel; a place of prayer and worship. This is very great joy. The office is in the vestry and this gave us the space to plan a pleasant and functional office. Other spaces in church have been cleared, or cleaned, or sorted, or all three, so that the church is able to function as well as we can in the space that we have. There has been a lot of work by a very enthusiastic and committed band of workers. Thank you to them all.

So while we work and wait for long held needs to finally be met...we have a place to bring our prayers. Thanks be to God.

Holy Trinity School

As part of the fundraising initiatives for Holy Trinity School, the School PTA, with approval from School and the Governors, have joined **Your School Lottery** which anyone can take part in.



Your School Lottery is a

vetted organisation and allows players to support their local school directly. As a supporter, you can join for as little as £1 per week and for this you will then have the chance of winning a guaranteed weekly prize for someone within the school community. The more people that participate, the bigger this guaranteed prize becomes and the more money raised for our school. On top of this, you will also be entered into a separate draw with a chance to win an amazing £25,000 every week!

Every Saturday, both draws take place and results are posted on the **Your School Lottery** website. Winners are advised directly and paid automatically. All you need is to be over 16 and have a bank account, so please share with others in the community who may be interested in joining.

Joining 'Your School lottery' is easy. Just go to https://www.yourschoollottery.co.uk/play and follow the instructions. You'll receive your tickets within minutes.

How does the draw work?

There are 2 chances to win every week.

When you start supporting, you get your own unique 6 digit ticket number. You can purchase more than one number if you wish. The more numbers that are issued within our school community, the bigger the prize becomes. Each school will have its own weekly draw which only their supporters are entered into. This means that someone from within our school community is guaranteed to win every week. The size of the prize is published on the *Your School Lottery* website in the lead up to each weekly draw.

On top of this, a separate weekly draw will take place where 6 numbers (each being 0 to 9), will be drawn at random. If your six digit number(s) matches the six numbers drawn in sequence, then you've won £25,000!

And finally, in contrast to the National Lottery, who only pass on 28p in every pound, or the Health Lottery who pass on 20p to good causes, **Your School Lottery** promises a minimum PTA contribution of 40%!
