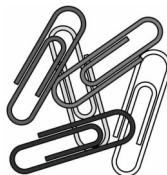

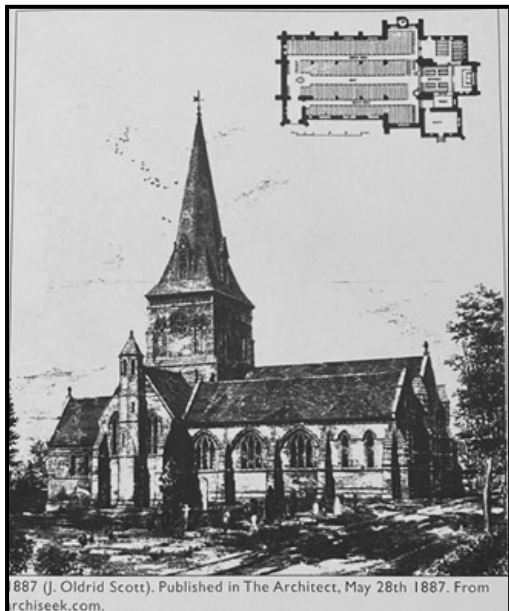

The Century Club

This article is an invitation to the community of Sunningdale to consider joining the Century Club; a group of one hundred individuals, families, businesses and institutions all playing a part in funding the transformation of the church into a community hub.



When this major renewal of the building is complete a large notice will be permanently on display recording all those who have helped make the project a reality. We shall list the grant making bodies such as the Garfield

Weston Foundation and the Prince Philip Trust. We shall happily list our own Sunningdale Parish Council whose funding has been a tremendous encouragement, and we shall list all those in the Century Club, writing their names into the history of the church.

The idea of funding and recording names is not new of course. Embedded in the fabric of a church are memories of love and affection, of a husband for his wife, of parents for their son or daughter, and of remarkable people from all walks of life. Even a short tour round church will reveal the names of those who have provided items such as a stained-glass window, the choir pews, the altar rail and many other items.

In the lady chapel the refurbishment of the sanctuary area was funded by William Trotter of Kings Beeches. Does that ring any bells? His son, Henry, funded the building of the Village Hall in memory of his father. Funding for the good of others seems to have run in the family.

Our Century Club is a request for £3,000 from 100 individuals, families or businesses. These gifts will contribute to creating the largest community space since the Village Hall was built in 1909, well over a century ago.

Transforming Trinity is not just a description of the changes to the fabric, but a fundamental shift from the church building being the preserve of the Diocese and the congregation to becoming a building available and enjoyed by all. This project is a significant, truly once-in-a-lifetime undertaking.



It will both renew and re-imagine the building, and through the creation of a community hub we will share our iconic building with the community every day, and not just on Sundays. Holy Trinity will always be the Parish Church and able to fulfil all its obligations, but it can be so much more than that, the community needs it to be much more than that.

This level of radical change is not something undertaken lightly or very often, in fact it makes the previous additions to the church (the organ and extension in 1890 and the vestry in 1905) pale by comparison. The works we aim to accomplish are more than just a once in a generation event, more like once in 150 years. We welcome all who would like to be a part of that.

A gift to the church that is recorded and displayed is not for self-aggrandisement, but rather a way of demonstrating that the church and the community are something you care deeply about. When you visit the church you will see inscriptions that contain the words 'to the glory of God' and in memory of... Sometimes this is expressed in Latin.

Jesus summed up the commandments neatly. Love the Lord your God (with heart and soul and mind and strength) and love your neighbour as yourself.

Helping to fund the transformation of church into a community hub is to fulfil the command and provide a place for all to use and for all to come. Many of us will be happy that our funds have contributed to the whole scheme, but some may wish to fund something specific, as William Trotter did.

The Parish Council were specifically asked to fund the heart of the project, our hospitality and the new servery and social space will be funded by them. I think this a terrific example of the desire the Parish Council has to foster and encourage the community.

Perhaps someone reading this article might be inspired to consider doing something similar and fund a specific aspect of the project in memory of a loved one or to celebrate all that they have achieved. I would welcome you to come and have a conversation with me about that.

The Hobson Trust are supporting us on just that basis, with two items fitting their criteria within

the overall project. They are covering the cost of relocating the font and providing new automated doors that will sit alongside the ancient oak doors. (This facilitates both access and heat retention!)

The outcome of the Transforming Trinity project will be a renewed building with modern heating, new lighting, new furniture and a new mezzanine floor across the back of church incorporating a meeting room, toilet, store and a glorious new Upper Room benefitting from the great West Window.¹

The design has been carefully crafted to ensure that the parish church can do all that is expected as it has since this church was built in 1887. The design also creates and makes new rooms and spaces for the community to use and enjoy, not hired on a high commercial rate but on a modest cost-covering basis. This building, like the Village Hall, is for the community.

I would be delighted to have a conversation with anyone interested in becoming a member of the Century Club or indeed funding a specific aspect of the build. The details of how to get in touch are below.

Now as you would expect I am very enthusiastic to see this project completed and the transformation take place, but I recognise that friends in the community are equally enthusiastic about their projects.

We celebrated the news that the Novello Theatre has been saved for the communities of Sunning, (Hill and Dale). The Scouts are working as hard as they can towards a complete refurbishment of the hut on Sandy Lane and we support them in all they are doing.

Ultimately, we are stewards of the resources God grants and must follow our hearts and give where we can for the good of others and to the glory of God.

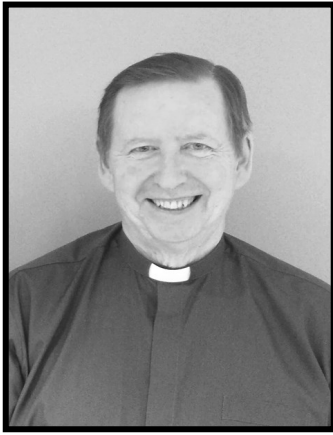

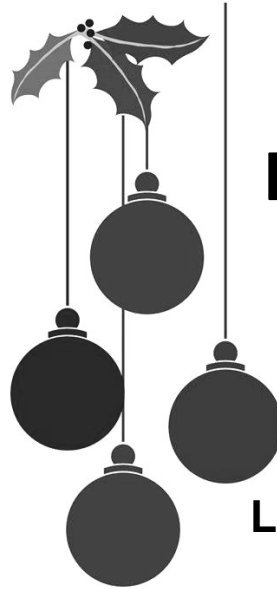

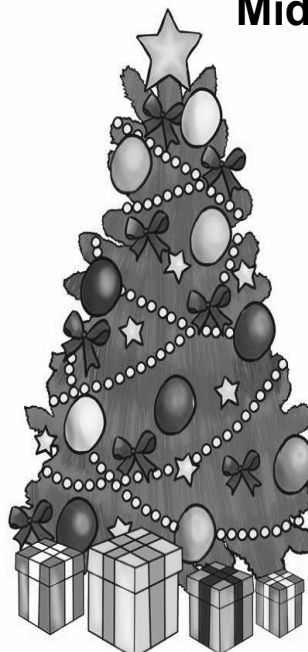

Sunninghill Theatre Saved From Closure

Local charity, The Sunninghill, Trust has stepped in to purchase and refurbish the Novello Picturehouse on behalf of the community, saving the historical theatre from the threat of demolition.

The theatre was gifted to the Sunninghill community in the 1920s before coming under the ownership of the Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead (RBWM) council. In recent months, it has been lying dormant after a long-term lease with a drama group expired, much to the concern of SL5 residents, many of whom have fond memories of building as both a theatre and as the affectionately known 'Fleapit' cinema.

Now the future of the building itself is secure, the immediate focus is creating a design for the new theatre.

In partnership with the project architect – local firm AT Designed Ltd – a number of focus groups have already been conducted with potential community users as well as professionals from the performing arts world to ensure the final design meets the needs of both today's society and tomorrow's generations.

After refurbishment, the Sunninghill Trust will make theatre available to local and professional performing arts groups through an affordable lease to the Cordes Hall Charity. The charity will run the neighbouring theatre and Cordes Hall together, operating as one vibrant arts hub, maximising the versatility of the buildings and increasing the number of flexible rentable spaces open to the community.

Responding to the news that the sale of the theatre to the Sunninghill Trust had concluded on Friday 30 May 2025, the Save the Novello Picturehouse Campaign coordinator, Alan Everett said: *"This is a fantastic outcome for local performers and residents, and we are deeply grateful to the Sunninghill Trust for their generous support. We look*



forward to continuing our partnership with the Trust during the initial refurbishment phase and ultimately bringing this much-loved historical building back to life."

The funding for the initial phase of the project will come from the Sunninghill Trust and ensure the building itself is brought up to modern standards. Additional fundraising, generated from the campaign group, will be used to cover the costs of the internal fit-

out of the theatre. Once a design has been developed and agreed, a monetary target will be announced alongside a proposal for fundraising activity.

Celebrating the purchase of the theatre, a spokesperson for the Sunninghill Trust commented: *"We are delighted*

to announce our significant support for this project by bringing an under-utilised asset back into community use. The theatre sits right in the heart of our support area. We look forward to working closely with the Cordes Hall Charity on this project."



The Sunninghill Trust was established in 1813 to provide winter fuel and ground for

allotments for the "poor and needy of the parish of Sunninghill and South Ascot" and was known then as the Fuel Allotment Trust. Today, the Sunninghill Trust believes that everyone deserves to live with dignity, comfort and peace, especially during life's most challenging moments. Throughout the year, the Trust distributes total grants of around £100,000 per annum to groups and individuals who fall within its charitable objectives and also makes its land available to the community through partnerships. News from Sandy Lane

I think we can all agree that it's been a bit warm over the last month or so. As Scouting is about adventure and doing risky things safely; we tend to spend the summer term outside as much as possible. This is also to give the leaders' hearing time to come back, as these little bundles of joy, no matter the age, are loud... no I mean LOUD.

If you go down to the woods today, you're in for a big surprise; You may have met the Squirrels while they were litter picking around Sunningdale just a few weeks ago. They have been out and about learning about the local community and environment this term and enjoyed the fresh air and chance to run around large open spaces making noise; well they are between the ages of 4 and 6. The Squirrels also joined the Beavers for the day at Bears Rails campsite which of course included a campfire and toasted marshmallows!

The Beavers (6-8) were no different, out and about in the local area learning about animals, birds and bugs. They explored Sunningdale Park, Silwood Park, Broomhall Rec and Earleywood in a term full of travel that would put an Oasis tour to shame. In May they had a wonderful camp at Bears Rails in the Great Park where they were joined by Berkshire Birds of Prey who helped them find out more about owls, hawks and kestrels. Luckily they left with as many birds as they arrived with as did the Beaver parents.

The Cubs (8-10½) have been outside for all the sessions this term – kayaking at Wokingham Waterside, bird watching at

Englemere Pond plus crate stacking and pioneering at Earleywood. The Cubs also helped out with some garden tidying and made hanging baskets for a patio at Dormy House. And then we've had the ever-popular annual shelter building event in Swinley Forest. The Cubs built shelters from branches and ferns for their Six and then the leaders used a watering can to test how weatherproof it was!! Needless to say 99% of the Cubs went home damp! We had our Summer camp at Longridge (near Marlow) where the Cubs did raft building, canoeing and laser tag as well as enjoying such culinary delights as ice cream on their

breakfast cereal!! To finish off the term we played Netbase Quidball (a fabulous game invented by Emma, one of the Cub leaders) down at the Rec and raced around the Holy Trinity playground like mad things in our go karts. Phew!

With the Scouts (10½ - 14) this term we had to expand due to demand and our ever-lengthening waiting list; we now have a Wednesday and Thursday night Troop giving young people Skills for Life. We hiked to the Great Park for a

weekend camp full of adventure, rafting and campfires. We only lost one frisbee to the Scouting gods which was then retrieved by the Beavers when they arrived for their camp a week later. Map reading is a core skill for Scouts, unfortunately teaching map reading is not a core skill any of the leaders possess; but while it was a bit hit and miss we did manage to get all the Scouts around the orienteering course in Swinley Forest. Hiking to chip shops is much more up our street and this term we visited Ocean Blue to rate and review the quality, so you don't have to.



The Explorers our eldest section, were as adventurous as you would expect, Go Karting, watery fun madness and flower arranging were key highlights to the term. Their camp however was on the Solent, sailing from the River Hamble they circumnavigated the Isle of Wight on the sailing yacht 'Discovery' and ate fish and chips.



We continue to look for volunteers who would be willing to help, so even more young people can benefit from Scouting in our locality. You do NOT have to be a frontline leader, behind the scenes support is just as vital such as fundraising, admin activities, operations of the Scout Hut and assets. Finally, we are continuing to fundraise for the refit of our Scout Hut which was built 58 years ago.
