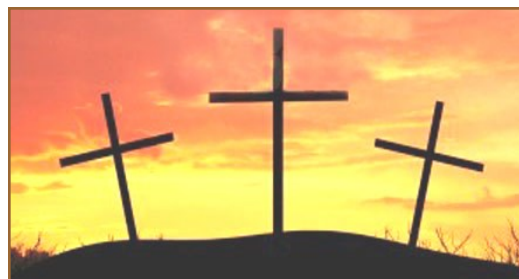

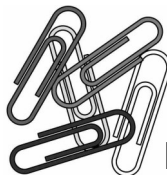

# Transforming Trinity

The question I am most often asked these days is "when will the building work begin Jon?" The shortest answer is a shrug of the shoulders and a vacant expression. In theory we are closing in on a start date because we have finally been able to take some steps, but I've given over forecasting a start date.

## Notification of Advice

The Church of England has its own planning permission system and is required to follow the Faculty Jurisdiction Rules 2015 (amended 2023!). It applies in every Diocese but as we've discovered, it's not applied in exactly the same way in every place. Some want an exhausting level of detail, others do not.

If I tell you that we reached Revision X, that is 24 revisions of the plans on the long journey to getting permission then you understand just how much back and forth there was. I have had the opportunity to explain to a senior individual in the Diocese that it would save considerable time and expense if the people wishing to put their opinion forward did so at the beginning as partners on the design team, not at the end which causes delays and additional expense.

Eventually I explained to the church building office that if we didn't move on soon I risked losing funding and thankfully my voice was heard. We progressed to the Notification of Advice which is the document the church building office sends to the registry (legal department) with their recommendation, which was that our scheme **should be approved**.

## Public Consultation

This allowed us to post the details of the project on the noticeboards and railings for everyone to comment if they wished. We were also obliged to write to the Victorian Society asking if they wished to become party opponents, ie to object and take the case to a consistory court. It was a happy day when I read the email saying they did NOT wish to oppose the plans.

We also wrote to two families whose ancestors have memorial plaques in the church which we will need to move and reposition. One gentleman replied to me direct (and didn't object) I'm hoping the other family feel the same way.

## Awaiting the Chancellor's reply

So, we have done all we can do and now we wait for the Chancellor. His Honour Judge David Hodge KC will

make the final decision on the project and we hope and pray he will sign the faculty and we can then start to take the next steps.

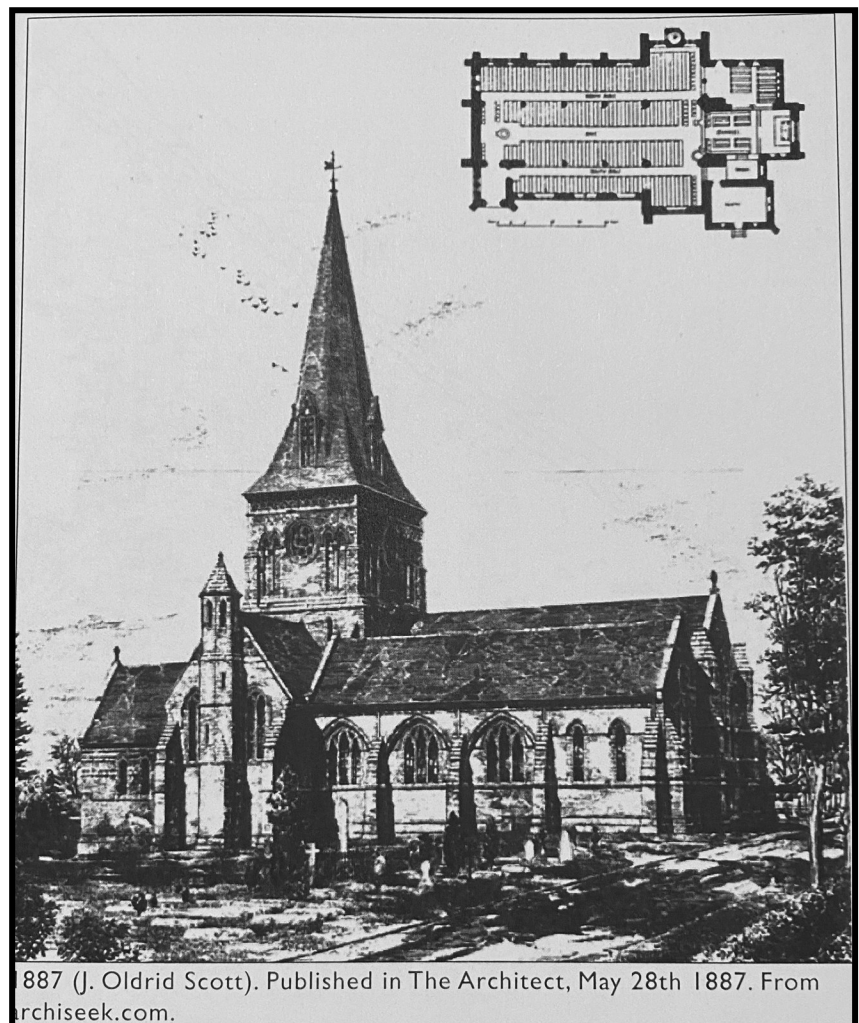
This will be to carry out preparatory works in church before handing over to the contractors to begin the main build. It will be a momentous occasion when that starts.

## When will it start??

Keep an eye on our website ([holyltrinitychurchsunningdale.co.uk](http://holyltrinitychurchsunningdale.co.uk)) and on the church noticeboard. When we know, we shall tell everyone everywhere!!

The church was built in 1839. The chancel remodelled in 1860. The rest of the old church was taken down and current church built in 1887. There have been cosmetic changes in the intervening years but nothing on the scale we hope to carry out in 2026, one hundred and thirty nine years on from when the church we know was created. Like our forebears, we are doing this for one reason only.

# Friendship

At 1 am on Friday the 26<sup>th</sup> September I was waiting in the kitchen for an ambulance. It was not a happy moment. I'd felt uncomfortable throughout Thursday, but the symptoms were not that unusual, I thought it was a bad attack of acid reflux. By 1 am I knew it was something else with all the classic symptoms of a heart attack. Once I'd phoned 111 and answered the questions, the guy I was speaking to told me he'd dispatched an ambulance, but we could carry on talking.



That eventually ended though and I was on my own. Katherine was away and I was left with the distinct possibility I was having a heart attack. Why is an elephant sitting on my chest?

Some years ago a men's group I was in was working through a book with questions after every chapter. One session was around friendship with the statement/question "a true friend is someone you can call at 1 am when you're in trouble. So, who do you have you can call?"

I'm happy to tell you I could think of quite a few people, in fact I was rational enough to work out, from among a large pool of friends, who might be the best to call. I thought a retired consultant anaesthetist and his wife, a former cardiac ward nurse might fit the bill and 10 minutes later they were in my kitchen offering wonderful solace.

"You don't look like you're having a heart attack" is a very comforting sentence. "Your pulse is fine, it's not a heart attack" is equally up there as what you want to hear.

They then began an interesting medical conversation about what might be causing the pain. They stayed until the ambulance came,

stayed while the paramedics did their tests, stayed while I got ready for the trip to Frimley Park. That is friendship.

While having all the checks in hospital it occurred to me that I'm the same age my Dad was when he had a triple by-pass. I recalled that two of my grandparents died from heart disease, but while I quietly prayed and miraculously stayed calm, I kept hearing my friends' voices. "You're not having a heart attack".

Some hours later I was ushered into the Doctor's cubicle and heard another comforting sentence. "I think I know what this is". It was pericarditis, inflammation of the pericardium, the sac around the heart. It's most often caused by a viral infection. It mimics the symptoms of a heart attack.

Later that day, other friends stepped in to take on the tasks I couldn't do and I was given the time to recover. Another friend is a retired doctor who visited with reassurance and encouragement.

Choosing to live the life of faith doesn't exempt you from shocks and trouble, ill-health and financial problems. God doesn't wave his hand over those who seek him to ward off any troubles. What he does do is promise to be with us whatever happens and I did feel God's presence through the drama of it.



What I will recall from this episode is the value of friendship that goes out of its way to be there when it matters. The gift of friendship given and received has the highest of all rewards and the reward is that you have a friend. It is a gift of incalculable worth.

Not that many weeks later I was calling another friend to come and rescue Katherine and I after the car broke down. (You might be thinking friendship with me is costly!). I hope I am as willing to give as I was to receive. But the question is worth pondering.

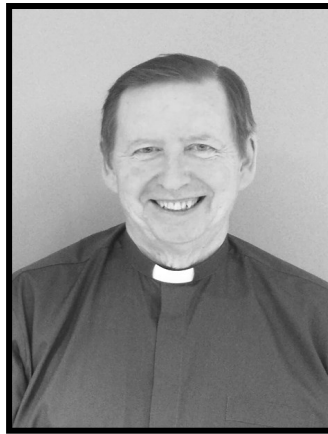

# Revd Terry

Even though I'm writing in mid-December - Happy New Year!

Those words were no doubt said by billions

of people around the world as the passing of the old year into the new one was acknowledged in varying traditional ways, some pagan, others Christian. For many years Scottish neighbours insisted on being the first people to cross my threshold holding a lump of coal and a bottle of whisky to secure "good fortune" for both households – even though

I had a gas fire. Thankfully they moved on a few years ago. However, I now have new Spanish neighbours. I wonder if they will invite me to uphold with them the Spanish tradition of eating 12 grapes on New Year's Eve supposedly to bring good luck, prosperity and fortune for each of the 12 months to follow.

Until I looked it up, I didn't know that the traditional New Year focus for Christians is spiritual renewal, prayer, gratitude to reflect on God's faithfulness and blessings, and celebrating Epiphany (when Jesus was revealed to the world by the Wise Men) on January 6<sup>th</sup> bringing the close to the Christmas season.

I rather like the sound of that - revitalising my life to align more with Jesus which in turn will lead me to a more wholesome and vibrant life. Maybe a good start would be to adopt a New Year bible verse such as 2 Corinthians 5:17 - *Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come.*

Well, certainly by the time you read this the New Year will have come. So how did you celebrate New Year? Did you toast it in with a glass of bubbly (another tradition!) or were you like me, safely tucked up in bed, fast asleep?

Each of us will experience bereavement uniquely and yet there are common themes and issues. The Bereavement Journey gently unpacks these themes to give those attending an opportunity to reflect and explore the impact loss has had.

These topics include:

- Attachment, separation and loss
- The impact and pain of bereavement
- Anger and guilt
- Coping with others' reactions
- Adjusting to change
- Delayed and suppressed grief
- Moving forward healthily.

In a kind and supportive group that makes no demands, participants are able to consider their experience of bereavement and where they are on the journey. All are welcome whatever the passage of time since bereavement occurred.

Our evening service will be Holy Communion with "the imposition of ashes". As a sign of

penitence and mortality, the sign of the cross is made on the forehead. For Christians it is a recognition of our own failings and the need we have for the grace of God shown in Jesus Christ. It begins a journey through Lent to its climax on Easter Sunday.

### News from Sandy Lane

Sunningdale Scouts is one of the oldest Scout groups in the country. Founded in 1910 we continue to welcome generations of local families through our doors.

**Squirrels** began the term with such enthusiasm they needed a camping weekend to recover. Once back at the hut, they earned their Brilliant Builder badge with wonderful creations, then went "Go Wild" learning about endangered animals. Their autumn hike in Sunningdale Park naturally included compulsory puddle-jumping. Halloween crafts, fireworks fun occurred before the term closed with mince pies, Christmas crafts and enough glitter to redecorate the hut twice over.

**Beavers** crammed in a huge amount, starting with an adventure around Royal Holloway and its resident peregrine falcons, followed by a bat walk where they wielded sonar detectors like tiny Ghostbusters. Den building at Earleywood briefly transformed them into waterproofing experts. They rocketed through a space night, braved a Sunningdale night hike and literally climbed the walls at Clip 'n Climb. Festive crafts and a generous badge haul rounded off an energetic term.

**Cubs** kicked off at Earleywood, mastering fire-lighting and producing camp bread that was almost entirely edible. The 12th century then arrived in person thanks to visiting reenactors. Cubs built bug hotels, learned money skills, supported the foodbank and celebrated Diwali with sweets and investitures. They charged through Dark Games in the woods, perfected road safety (hedgehog transformations optional), and alternated between donutting and air rifle shooting. Christmas crafts, games and a blizzard of badges wrapped up an action-packed term.

**Scouts** had a lively term which included fire-lighting, outdoor cooking and crafting their own woggles before braving the legendary Chip Shop Challenge night hike. Wide games on Chobham Common brought high-energy chaos and impressive teamwork. They reflected on Remembrance and took part in Parliament Week, discovering how democracy actually works. A Repair Shop session revealed hidden practical skills: yes, they *can* sew on badges, but no, they'd rather not.

**Explorers** eased in with a campfire welcome, then leapt into building challenges and a sensory night hike. Spooktober saw them filming a movie in Sunningdale Park and helping run the Group Quiz Night. They connected with Scouts worldwide during JOTA/JOTI and debated democracy enthusiastically during Parliament Week. Their creativity peaked during a stop-motion animation night, culminating in the premiere of their spooky film. All in all a laughter-filled term.

As this newsletter proves, all good things eventually end, after six years as Chair of Trustees, Micky King is handing over the reins. Micky, humble despite owning a sparkly gold jacket, has been a tireless champion of the hut rebuild, and we remain deeply grateful for his dedication and commitment to our community.

We are delighted to welcome our new Chair, Vanessa Goodenough. Vanessa moved to Sunningdale four years ago, has a child in Squirrels, and brings excellent experience onto our Trustee Board.

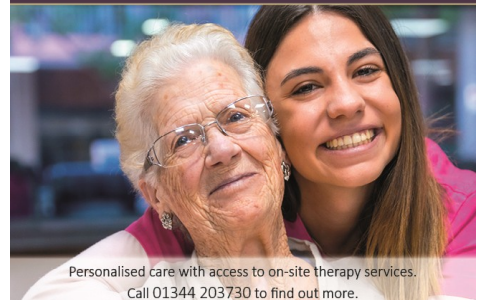
