Transforming Trinity...All Being Well

I grew up with the phrase 'All Being Well'. I don't think I ever heard any plan being made, any arrangement, any small or large thing without All Being Well getting tacked on the end. It ends up being a default way of thinking.

Unsurprisingly I use it myself. Yes, I'll drive up and collect you from the station – all being well. I'll cook the evening meal tonight – all being well. I'll see you in a week's time after my pilgrimage walk – all being well.

Does it betray a lack of confidence in an ability to plan and the kindness of the universe? Or is it an acceptance that life doesn't always go as smoothly as we would like? Bearing in mind I heard this phrase countless times from my father I would have to say the latter. Life didn't always go smoothly for him and he half expected something to go amiss, which is not a great way to live; permanently anxious that some calamity will occur.

And yet I find it's probably the most appropriate phrase to use when it comes to a timeline for the Transforming Trinity project. If everything occurs in sequence as we hope and pray it will, we shall be closing the church down for major internal re-building in June/July 2025 (all being well).

Our project manager, Paul Sharman, has used his considerable experience to map out a timeline with dates for when certain key things will occur. This gives us a full year for the fundraising and during the year we hope to get the faculty permission from the Diocese (Sep - Nov 24) and from the

planning department at the Borough. To be granted permission from the Diocese we have to present our plans, receive a YES, have a 28 day notification period and then wait for the Diocesan Chancellor's decision. There's a similar time delay with the Borough...but we hope to gain our permissions before the end of this year (ABW).

This gives the architect and associated professionals a 6 month period to do the detailed design work ready to present in September (24) and that work is already underway.

Once we have our permissions in place the project ramps up with the selection of suitable contractors, a recommended tender list, the tender process, a PCC decision and approval and a lovely period of 6 weeks which Paul describes as "mobilisation".

This will have taken us past Easter 2025 and if everything has gone to schedule then the work can begin, which involves closing the church for 38 weeks with the aim of re-opening for Easter 2026.


All being well.

I think the big mistake would be to hold on to the timeline and dates as if life itself depended upon them. There are so many steps on the journey, all different and all quite complex, anything can occur that might cause a delay, but without a basic plan to work to there would be no idea about when the project might actually occur. Better to have a plan that gets delayed than no plan at all. So after all this time and all the work and all the conversations and all the efforts made we have reached a stage where we can start talking about when it will happen - June/July 2025 (ABW).

This allows us to plan for church life in exile as we won't be able to use the building, and this might be highly relevant to local families who are thinking about a wedding in 2025. Make it before 31st May is my advice!!

There's a long way to go but we are beginning to see when it will be accomplished.

This table is a simplified version of Paul Sharman’s more detailed timeline for the project.

1. *Fundraising – see below.*
2. *Faculty preparation. The extensive amount of paperwork, drawings, plans and details we have to present to the Diocese for their approval including the statements of need and significance.*
3. *Assuming the Diocesan Advisory Council approve the plans, we have a statutory 28 day notice period for anyone to comment, and then await the Chancellor’s decision.*
4. *In the same time frame we shall apply to the Borough for the external aspects of the plan.*
- 5/6. *The whole tender process begins with shortlisting suitable contractors and taking it through to signing contract documents.*
7. *Mobilisation. In essence, getting essential preparation done so that nothing holds up phase 8.*
8. *Construction.*
9. *Re-equipping and preparing for a return to the church building.*

Transforming Trinity : Fundraising.

In the long process of developing this project we were working towards a budget of 1.1 million pounds and our architect designed various options for us to choose from with that figure in mind. Once the back and forth discussions with the Diocese had taken place, plans were revised and submitted again and time has passed by, time that has also allowed for inflation. Our budget is now £1,525,000!!

We are in a good position to add to the funds already raised and have appointed a professional fundraiser to assist with applications to grant making bodies whose criteria match our own.

Our invitation is to anyone and everyone local to Sunningdale to consider whether or not a gift to the church matches their own aspirations and hopes for the community.

By re-imagining and re-designing the church building we are creating a community hub; a place where all can come and all can use. The re-design will create the café, social space and additional rooms, but that is just one aspect. Our intention is to make an impact on isolation and loneliness, deprivation and the burden of carers and parents.

Knowing there’s a place you can always come to and always be welcome, to enjoy activity or simply to enjoy conversation lies at the heart of the Transforming Trinity project and we would welcome a conversation with anyone who is in a position to assist with funding.

Note also – some of the pledges made were to fund the project over a three-year period and this is highly relevant to us. We shall commit to build what we know we can afford and knowing that funds will still be coming in

Funerals: A Question of Faith?


Stephen Cotterill, the Archbishop of York defined faith as not holding out your hand in the dark and *knowing* it will be held but holding out your hand in the dark and *believing* it will be held. Otherwise, faith becomes a certainty and uncertainty, or doubt is an integral part of Christian faith; they are two sides of the same coin; they belong together.

Faith is a relationship just like a marriage. And as in any marriage whilst there will be times of joy and happiness there will also be times of un-knowing and uncertainty, times of doubt and despair, none more so perhaps than when we face up to our own imminent death or the death of a loved one.

My faith tells me it's ok to have questions like ...what will happen to me after I breathe my last? Where is heaven? When will I meet Jesus face to face? Will I be reunited with my loved ones at some point? ...without knowing the answers.

If you have questions like those, why wait until planning a funeral to ask them? Let's talk things through over coffee one morning.

Harrison and Harrison – Premier League

I imagine most of you reading this will have been in the parish church for an event where the church organ has been played. Although we have a digital keyboard with an astonishing range of sounds – not least church organ sounds – there is nothing quite like the genuine article partly because it can be felt as well as heard. When the stops are all open the deep bass notes send a tremor through the building and the souls who are singing, there is nothing quite like it.

Toward the end of 2023 we received a request from the project manager at Harrison and Harrison who manufactured the organ asking if he could come and inspect the instrument as part of the PhD he was doing into H&H Organ Builders. It seemed too good an opportunity to miss, what more could we learn about the instrument?

We already knew it was second hand. Originally built in 1865 for St. Martin-on-the-Hill, Scarborough who claimed it was insufficiently powerful. Quite what the connection was with Sunningdale is buried in H&H's extensive archive, but negotiation took place to bring it to Holy Trinity.



It replaced a smaller church organ given by Mr Arbuthnot of Coworth Park and when first installed was partly in the old vestry and partly on the opposite side of the chancel – that is, half of it was where it is now and half was somehow on the opposite side where the chapel is. What a shame we have no picture of that! After they had extended the old vestry into the current organ chamber, the whole thing was re-assembled in the one place, just as we still have it. There's more though to the story.

Thomas Harrison was from Rochdale and his business went bust so he headed further north and

settled in Durham. A new firm was started with his son who turned out to be better at building instruments than his dad. It must have been a considerable puzzle to them that St. Martin's rejected the instrument we now have, but undaunted they took it apart, re-assembled it at Holy Trinity and used it as an example of what they were capable of. They brought prospective clients to see and hear our church organ and on the back of this instrument gained commissions to build many more in cathedrals and notable churches. In ten years, they were the premier church organ builders in the UK. All on the back of our (second hand) instrument.

I'm pleased to report that our visitor was able to confirm how well the current tuner (Alan Salt) is looking after the instrument and the quality of his careful repairs to some heavy-handed treatment back in the 80s. All our plans for Transforming Trinity include keeping the organ exactly where it is and maintaining it for future generations to enjoy.

We are exploring the possibility of bringing the fan and lowest bellows out of the cellar room and into the organ chamber but it will depend on room and cost. And who knows, a future generation might decide to add to the existing pipes and make the organ grander still; after all the top manual (keyboard) is a dummy – unconnected to anything. If St. Martin's had paid for the extra pipes perhaps it would have been as powerful as they had intended and it would never have found its way to us. But they didn't and it made its way south. I'm very glad it did.

CAL is the overseas charity we have been supporting through Stephanie Hynard who is a member of church and works with the charity. It is a tremendous privilege to support CAL and enjoy seeing the progress made. Although currently abroad, Stephanie emailed the following...

It's such a joy to be reporting back on the progress of the special school now established at Gampola in Kandy with 24 young people attending full time education.

A year ago, when I made my visit, children attended on a part-time basis, but the families had to meet the cost of a tuk-tuk to get their children to the unit. The three teachers struggled to provide education in a breeze block building that had no fan or air-conditioning, and only running water for two days a week, and very few education resources.

CAL is a Christian charity, and they were initially undecided whether they would be able to meet the needs of these special children. However, when they received the news that Holy Trinity Church was going to support them, they felt confident to rent a bigger building. Now there are 4 classrooms, a hall and kitchen. Every child has a table and chair and Fathima has a brand new wheelchair.



I've continued to work with the teachers via zoom, showing them how to develop the resources that came from our resource cupboards at the back of the church.

They bought a photocopier and a laminator, which means that materials can be used several times. Rather than trying to teach children in one large group, they now understand the need to divide the children into

age groups or ability groups to make sure that learning can be planned more appropriately. They have created an apprenticeship program for students who are over 18, and they are learning catering and simple maintenance tasks whilst another group is setting up an enterprise based on making jewellery and has already sold bracelets to friends and family.



Every fortnight my WhatsApp inbox is filled with photos of the progress being made. Last week I received photos of 8 young adults in the apprenticeship group making their first train journey, learning how to buy a ticket and sit quietly in the train.

Amazing smiles from all the young people at the pleasure of being treated as young adults.

The staff have also made a commitment to their own continuing professional development. Together we follow a vocational program on special education, and I set them tasks to discuss and feedback their ideas to me. One teacher, Chamila, has been interested in learning how to use sign language and some of the money raised by Holy Trinity Church is funding her course. Another teacher Fatima is completing a certificate in Special Education.



Sam, initially a temporary administrator has now made a commitment to staying with the Gampola School. He sends me wonderful emails, telling me the difference we make. He really appreciates having the support from the church family. The staff and parents are so proud that their progress is shared with other people.

Following our Volunteer Open Day at our hut in January we have now welcomed three new Scout Leaders and one new Squirrel Leader. We're now focussed on finding more volunteers so we can open a second Squirrel Drey on a Friday and a second Beaver Colony on a Tuesday.

As you can see our new hut plans are keeping us very busy. However, it has not distracted us from creating amazing activities for all our sections.
